

Investigator: Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU) - Rochester

The Office of the Attorney General is seeking qualified candidates for Investigator positions located in various locations in the State. Candidates should be hard-working, motivated and committed to public service on behalf of the people of the State of New York.

MFCU is the centerpiece of New York's effort to investigate, penalize, and prosecute individuals and companies responsible for improper or fraudulent Medicaid billing schemes. In addition, the MFCU is the only law enforcement agency in the state specifically mandated to investigate and prosecute abuse and neglect of residents in nursing homes, hospitals, and other facilities that provide care to unrelated adults. **The qualifications for this position are: Extensive experience in supervision, "white collar" investigations, internal affairs investigations, the development and facilitation of in-house training, and complex criminal investigations including surveillance cases, with extensive law enforcement contacts in the greater Rochester area. Must be a certified polygraph examiner.**
